Out of the Past

November 9, 1895

All of the active copper mines of the celebrated Lake Superior district, nine in number, are located within the limits of Houghton County. The Houghton County mine inspector's annual report for the period ending September 30, 1895 shows that the average force employed by the nine active mines was 7,249, a decrease of 189 as compared with the previous year. The force of miners employed has decreased slightly each year since 1891, from the maximum number of 7,702. Notwithstanding the decrease in employees the output has increased with the advent of improved methods and machinery. The record of fatal accidents for this period is a sad one with 1895 recording 46 miners killed. In the past seven years there has been nearly 600 men killed in the copper, iron ore and gold mines of the Upper Peninsula.
