




An open house was held for the recently completed Guardian Angels' Church Rectory (412 Crystal Avenue). The \$78,000 two story building of Iannone stone was erected by the Novara Brothers of Iron Mountain and is styled to match the church completed in 1953. The new structure is attached to the church by a glassed-in passageway which also serves as an auxiliary entrance to both the church and rectory from the front and rear. Two stories provide space for guest rooms, completely modern kitchen area, dining rooms, library and office. The basement serves as a spacious garage and modern laundry. The structure was built behind the ancient frame home that has served as the rectory since before the turn of the century which will be completely removed from the lot and completely re-landscaped in the future.

OPEN HOUSE SUNDAY — The newly completed Guardian Angels' rectory will be open to inspection during an open house planned for Sunday, from 2 until 5 p. m., the Rev. Fr. C. J. Petranek has announced. The new rectory, the rear of which is shown above, is just west of the church, behind the frame home that has served the parish since the late 1800s. The interior work on the new building will be completed this week.

AN AUXILIARY ENTRANCE to both Guardian Angels' church and the new rectory is provided for in the design of the enclosed passage between the two buildings. The glassed-in "breezeway" can be entered from either the front or rear of the buildings, and in addition to an entrance, provides a weather proof passage between the rectory and church.
