Out of the Past

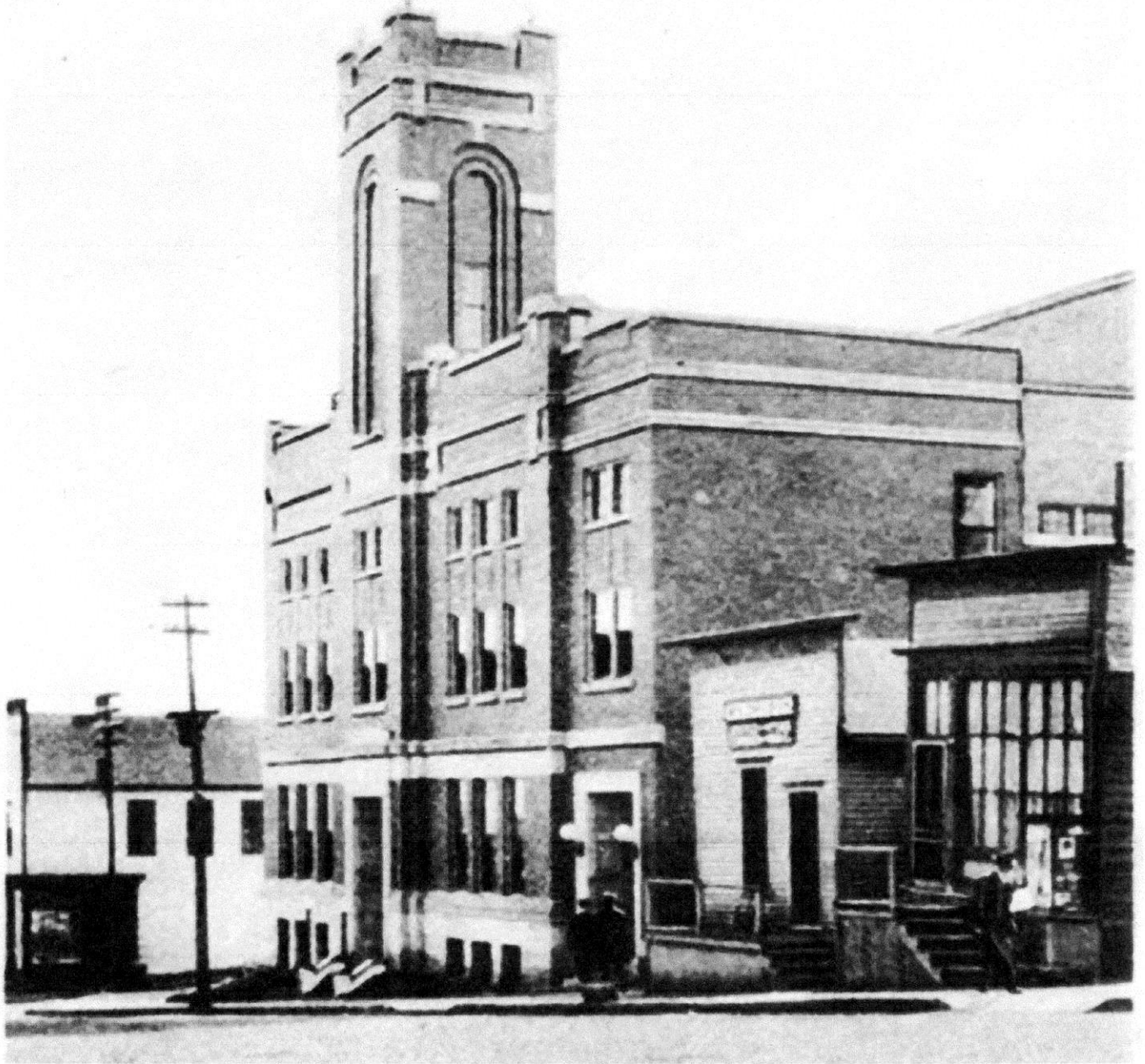

The historic building located next to the Crystal Falls City Hall (411 Superior) where Ivar Maki had operated his tailor shop since 1924 will soon be a memory. The building, purchased by Paul Schultz, is being razed and the lot cleared for possible future use. Maki, the longtime Finnish tailor, moved to the building in 1924 after being forced to move from his previous location at 329 Superior which he occupied since 1914 when the new building expansion for Crystal Falls Co-Op Store (337 Superior) relocated two buildings down Superior Avenue by one lot. The building has a long history of housing various photography businesses dating back to the 1890's including Frederick J. Neal, Simon R. Maki, Anna Soderbeck, A. Conant, John Harmanmaa, William Thomas, Charles Rogers (Electric Studio) and Anderson.

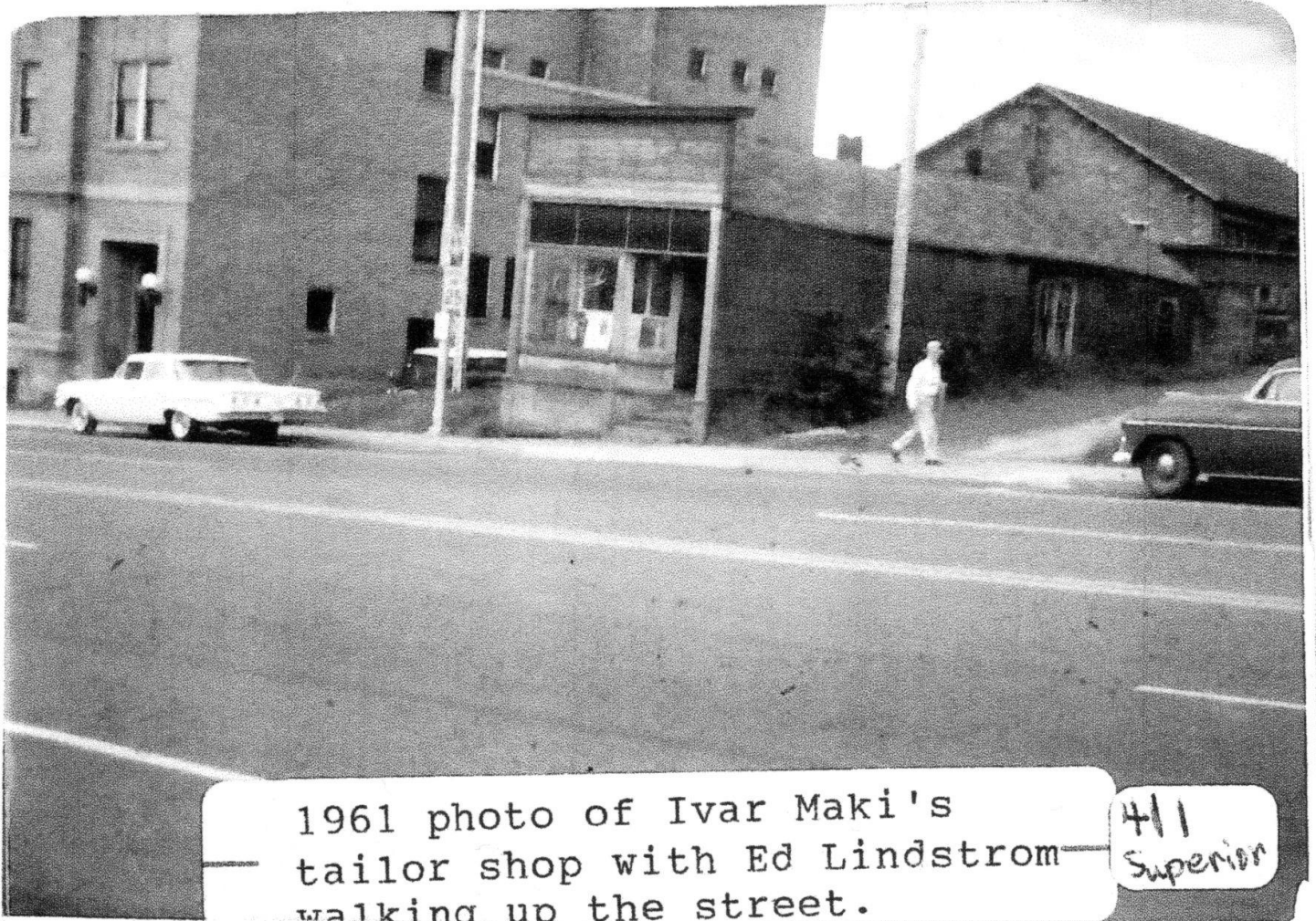

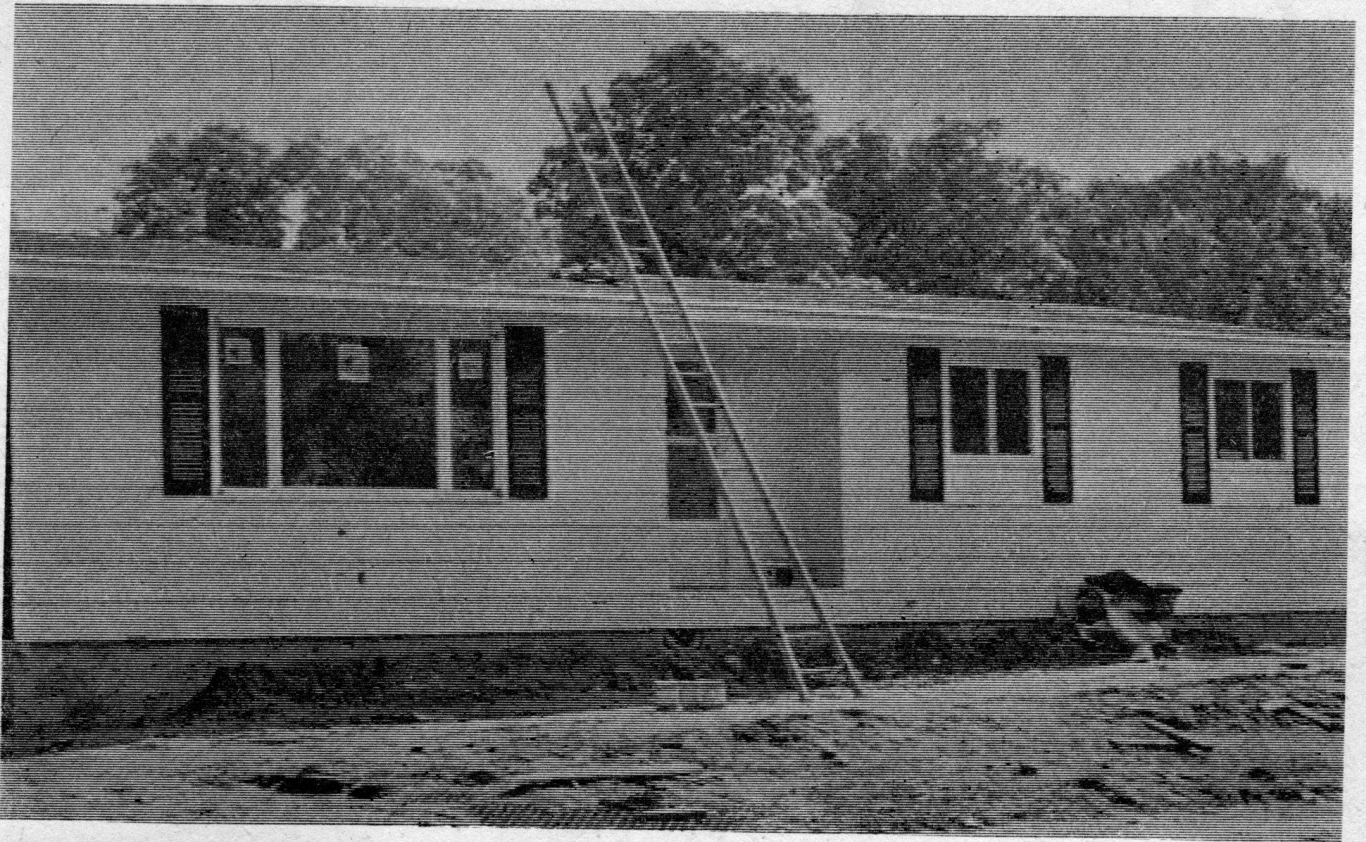
