

Mary Joy Sartori was the big point-getter setting new records with her 5' high jump and running a leg of the 440 relay team plus finishing third in both the 100 yard dash and long jump. Bonnie Bates set a new record in the mile run and Chris Dishaw broke her own U.P. record in the 440 yard dash.

A new Wigwam has been completed at Bewabic State Park on Fortune Lake. The beautiful and sturdy structure was constructed using the existing old stone fireplace from the former structure which was demolished in September 1973 as a centerpiece. The original landmark Wigwam was constructed in 1933 by depression era work crews of the Civilian Works Administration a division of the Civilian Conservation Corps.
